Vision


Camp Noah will serve disaster-impacted children and families by building resiliency, restoring hope and changing lives.

Prepared Children Improve Family Preparedness

In late 2014, nine-year-old Pa Ka Baw Moo moved from a Karen refugee camp in Thailand to St. Paul, Minnesota, with her family. She joined us at Camp Noah in August. At camp, Pa Ka Baw Moo drew a picture of Thailand and talked about how much she missed home. The other children in the group, some who had been in the U.S. much longer, responded with, "Sometimes we miss it too!" and "So cool that you had a piq!"

Later that day, we talked about tornados, floods, and fires and how to stay safe, and then handed out Preparedness Backpacks for each camper. Pa Ka Baw Moo exclaimed, "We don't have tornados in Minnesota!" Another student agreed, "I'm sure there are no tornados here. That doesn't happen in America!" The biggest surprise for them was that tornados and floods do happen here — and the biggest surprise for us was that the preparedness portion of our curriculum was perhaps the most important topic of the week for these refugee children.

The preparedness conversation continued for the campers. One of the girls decided this information was so important it should be translated, so she made sure the other campers heard the message in Karen and understood. Questions were asked and answers given and all were grateful for the information.

As the week continued to progress, Pa Ka Baw Moo made new friends and had more conversation about missing home and yet enjoying this new adventure. She sang, danced, laughed, and taught us a new game with a really large rubber band chain called "rope."

On Friday, she was sad to see the week end, but she put her "rope" in her Preparedness Backpack (you should have something to play with if you have to go to a shelter!) and left with a smile on her face, new resiliency skills, preparedness tools, and hope.

Resilient Communities Nurture Resilient Children

In 2015, we encountered a church and community whose resilience and strength brilliantly embodied Noah's Wise Words. On November 17, 2013, a deadly tornado swept through Brookport, Illinois. Afterward, many stepped in to serve and rebuild.

Disaster, by definition, overwhelms the resources of a community. Disaster changes the lives of those directly impacted and can change the fabric of a community as well. However, in many places, disaster also brings stronger relationships, new resources and networks, and increased resiliency.

More than a year after the tornado, we met Ms. Tiffany Benberry. Ms. Tiffany and her husband, Pastor Joseph Benberry, serve Metropolis and nearby Brookport at Mt. Horeb Church. Before the disaster, they dreamed of serving children and providing opportunities for all to live in economic stability.

Since the tornado, they have worked tirelessly alongside other local churches and organizations to help all people in the community recover. The Benberrys and Mt. Horeb Church continue to serve children and provide resources and economic opportunities for area families.

When we approached the church about hosting a Camp Noah event, they immediately said, "Yes!" Over the next few months, they jumped into preparing for camp and bringing many people together to make it happen.

Thanks to the efforts of Ms. Tiffany and everyone involved, the children who attended Camp Noah in Metropolis had the opportunity to learn that a disaster — or other challenging experiences in life — gives us a chance to learn about our own strength and the strength of our community.



Children learned.

- 99% of campers surveyed learned two or more resiliency skills during Camp Noah.
- 97% of campers said,"I learned that I am somebody special."
- 90% of campers said they learned how to stay safe during stormy weather.
- 92% of campers said they learned what their gifts and talents are.
- 96% of campers said,"I have hopes and dreams for the future."
- And—98% of campers said they had fun at Camp Noah!

In 2015, **100% of parents** reported they would recommend **Camp Noah** to other parents.

Volunteers grew.
