On Tuesday, as he shared his story, it was apparent that Randy's life had been changed by the rippling impact of the tornados' destruction. His house was intact, but friends had moved, been hurt or suffered loss, and his home was chaos. "Before the tornado I had a home," he said, "Now I just have a house that people fight in." As the week progressed, Randy shared that he had gone home and told his family how he was feeling and he had decided he wasn't going to fight with his siblings and instead would be a peacemaker. He said his preparedness backpack would make him less afraid of stormy weather. He declared that his gift and talent was to make people smile and his dream was to be a drummer and make music. His mother thanked the camp staff on Friday for helping her son understand his feelings and re-engage with his family. As Randy left Camp Noah on the final day, he had a huge smile on his face. Randy had a wonderful week where he learned he wasn't alone or weird, and he knew, once again, his future was full of sunbeams!

Jaylily's family was so grateful to see the changes in her and commented on how much fun the week had been, filled with friends and new resiliency skills.

My experience as a small group leader was invaluable... My heart was deeply touched by the stories I heard from the children in my small group.
